Report on the Displacement Movement to Aden Governorate

16 September 2026



1. Executive Summary

This report documents the movement of displacement to Aden Governorate, based on the reports of field teams issued by the Executive Unit for the Management of IDP Camps, which have been integrated and audited in the field until September 16, 2026.

Accordingly, the net approved for this update reached (1,622) displaced families, with a total of (7,162) individuals, distributed among several receiving districts in Aden governorate, foremost of which is Al-Buraiqa district, followed by Dar Saad and then Mansoura

The data of Al-Asl governorate shows that the vast majority of displaced families came from Hodeidah and Taiz governorates, and this displacement movement is directly related to the Houthi militias' continued escalation of their military actions and their bombardment of residential areas and districts in the two governorates, which prompted large numbers of families to be forcibly displaced towards Aden in search of safety

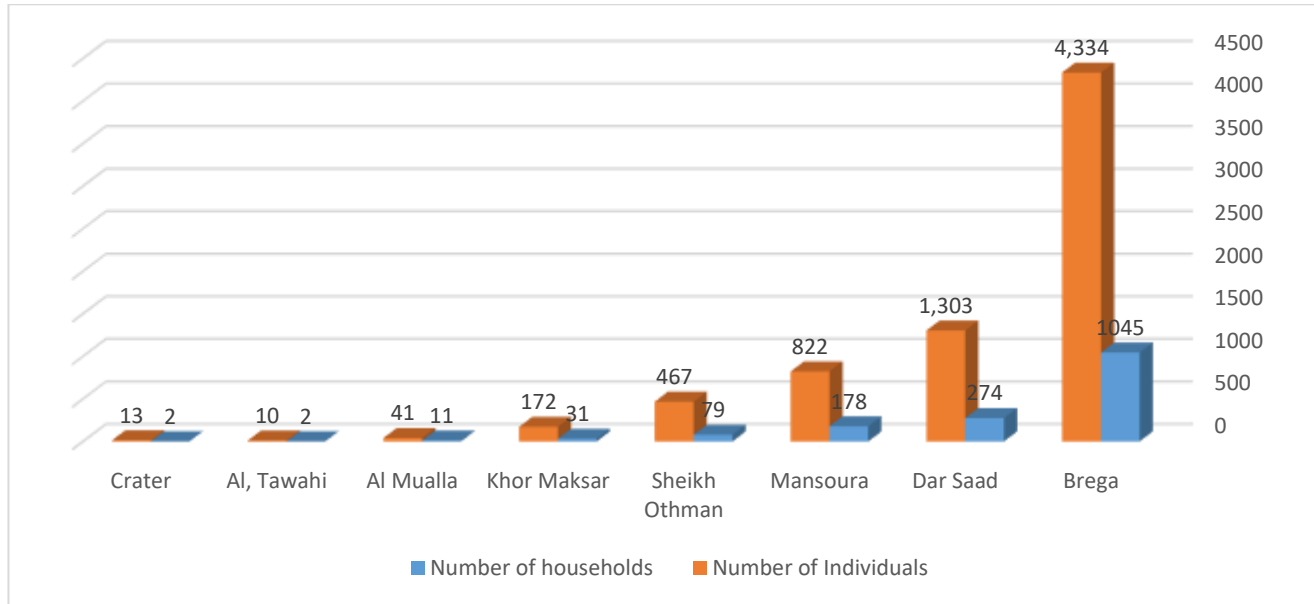
Displaced families face urgent humanitarian needs, including shelter, food, water, health care and protection, in the absence of an active sectoral response mechanism as of the date of preparation of this report, and no interventions have been monitored at the date of the preparation of this report, except for the distribution of some limited ready-to-eat meals to some families.



2. Displaced people according to the Reception Directorate in Aden Governorate

The following table shows the distribution of displaced families according to the receiving district within Aden governorate, and the Buraika district accounts for the largest share of the expatriates, followed by Dar Saad and then Mansoura.

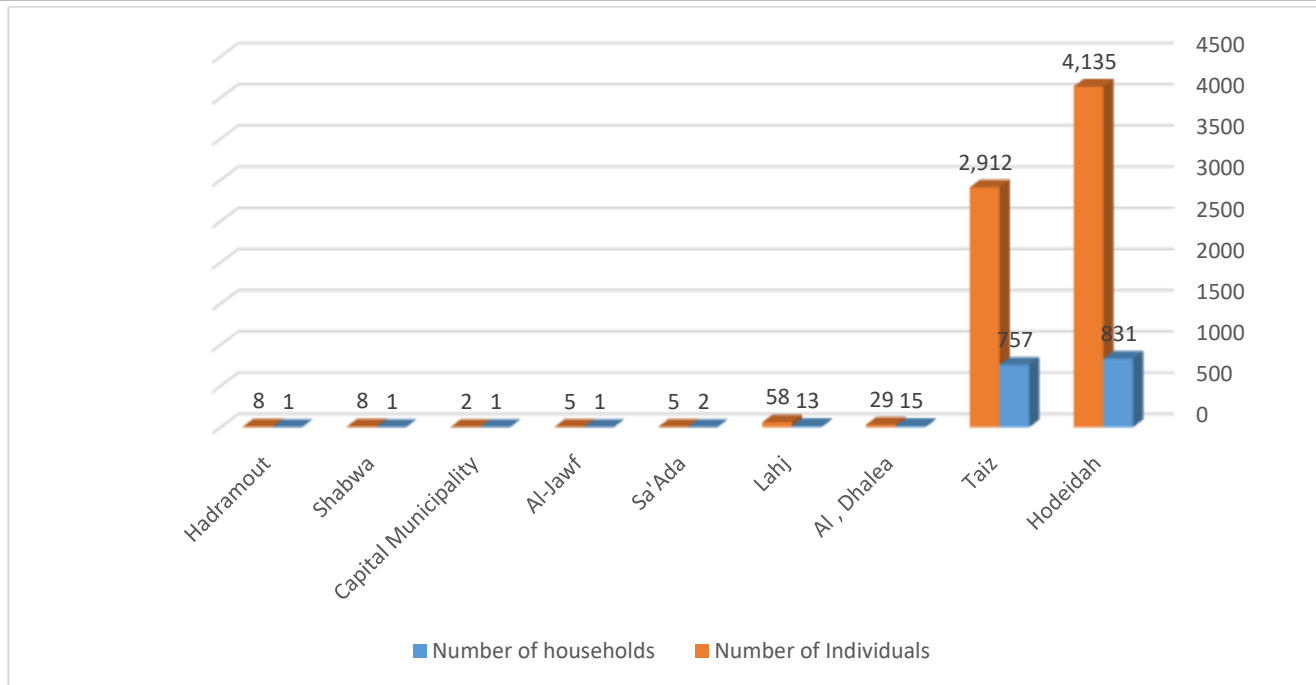




3. Displaced people by governorate of origin

All of the near-total displacement mentioned in this update are related to the governorates of Hodeidah and Taiz, where together they represent more than 95% of the total displaced families in this report, while limited numbers were reported from the governorates of Al-Dhale, Lahj, Saada, Al-Jawf, Amanat Al-Asimah, Shabwa and Hadramawt.

4. Humanitarian situation and type of shelter

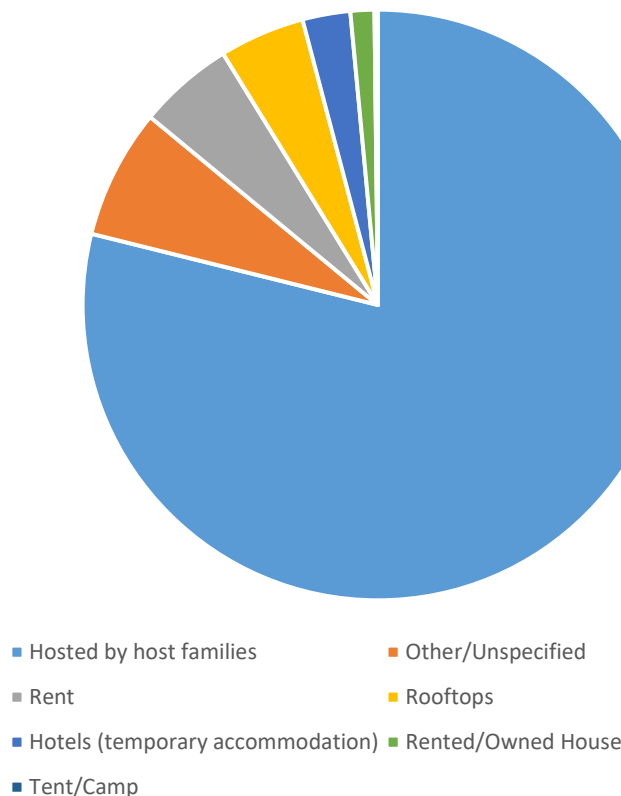
Documented data on the type of shelter (available for 535 families out of the total number of displaced families, as the type of shelter was not documented for the rest of the 1,087 families) shows that the vast majority of families rely on "hosted by host families", reflecting increasing pressure on communities and host families in reception areas and the absence of sustainable shelter solutions

Displaced families face multiple needs, including shelter and basic shelter items, food and safe drinking water, as well as limited access to health and protection services, with additional needs of the most vulnerable groups, including children, women, the elderly and people with disabilities

5. The Efforts of the Executive Unit for the Management of IDP Camps

1. Receiving the newly displaced people arriving in Aden Governorate and following up on their situation
2. Forming field teams to monitor and count the newly displaced families, by going down to the access areas and IDPs gatherings in the districts of Buraiqa, Dar Saad, Mansoura, Sheikh Othman, Khor Maksar and other receiving districts.



3. Initial verification of family numbers and locations, and collection of basic data on displacement conditions and basic humanitarian needs
4. Coordinating with humanitarian partners, local authorities and security authorities to facilitate the reception of IDPs and their crossing into Aden Governorate
5. Reporting to the head of the executive unit, the local authority, relevant authorities and relevant humanitarian partners, with the aim of accelerating verification, referral and response procedures
6. Continue to follow up on the response situation and communicate with the relevant authorities on cases that have not yet been covered, in a way that contributes to directing efforts towards the most needy families and areas and reducing duplication in the provision of assistance

7. Priorities

- 1 Conduct an urgent multi-sectoral assessment of displaced families in the districts of Brega and Dar Saad, as the two districts that receive the most new arrivals
- 2 Complete documentation of missing fields (cause of displacement, type of shelter, gender composition) of incomplete records, to ensure accurate response planning
- 3 Activating a unified sectoral response mechanism (shelter, food, water and sanitation, health, protection) for this crowd of families, as there is no documented data on interventions implemented as of the date of preparation of this report.
- 4 Adopting a unified periodic update of the movement of displacement and response at the level of the districts of Aden governorate, with documentation of the implementing party, the date of intervention and the unique number of families after the removal of the duplicate



5 Recommendations and Humanitarian Appeal

- 1 Accelerate response to families, and not delay urgent interventions when there are clear humanitarian needs
- 2 Mobilizing the necessary resources from donors and humanitarian organizations to cover the needs of displaced families in the districts of Al-Brega, Dar Saad, Al-Mansoura, Sheikh Othman, Khor Maksar and other receiving districts
- 3 Support the completion of field verification and inventory work to ensure the accuracy of the approved numbers and avoid duplication in the provision of aid
- 4 Strengthen coordination between the Executive Unit, humanitarian partners and the local authority to ensure that aid reaches those most in need without delay
- 5 Activating protection, monitoring and referral mechanisms for the most vulnerable groups, especially children, women, older persons and persons with disabilities
- 6 Appeal to donors and humanitarian organizations to provide the necessary resources to scale up the response and ensure that no displaced family is left without minimal humanitarian assistance
